Hello everyone!

I hope that I find you well and in good spirits!

We began Outdoor Services last week - and everyone was most grateful! It was really good to see a few people again, and I want to thank everyone for their participation in the survey. As you will be aware, the Premier has lifted restrictions further to allow 20 people max at an Outdoor Service. This certainly takes the pressure off us - as we transition to a 'new normal.'

Therefore - some of you may like to change your mind about whether you would like to attend or not - which is absolutely fine and fantastic! In this pew bulletin I am going to suggest a rhythm over the next month that allows for some flexibility around attendance, and provide a number of options for you and your family members to participate in our faith gatherings.

A few things to note:

- 1. I am choosing not to offer communion at this stage for a variety of reasons.
- 2. ZOOM Church will <u>still</u> be offered on a regular basis, but not every Sunday! This means that we can conduct a service at Areegra that is not to late in the day, AND I can attend the COFFEE VAN Project for a good hour or so on a regular basis. It also allows for those 'afar' to participate in regular worship.
- 3. I <u>would like people to still 'book a place' for our Outdoor Services</u>. This makes it much easier for me to keep track of where there are spaces for participation, and means that we can comply with COVID expectations etc.
 - As you can imagine this requires a considerable amount of organization, and it is a little 'clunky' for people to 'book'. I think a natural rhythm will emerge and so I'm not panicking however, I will ask for your continued patience as we negotiate the changing nature of all of the above!
- 4. The Outdoor Service is quite different to our normal Sunday routine. This is deliberate, and while it may not meet your own spiritual needs during this time, I feel it is important that the focus for our gathering is on <u>PEOPLE</u>, and hearing <u>GOD'S WORD</u> in a fresh way. 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TODAY'S READINGS PENTECOST 20

First Reading:

Deuteronomy 34:1-12

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy

Then Moses climbed Mount Nebo from the plains of Moab to the top of Pisgah, opposite Jericho. There the Lord showed him the whole land - from Gilead to Dan, all of Naphtali, the territory of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Mediterranean Sea, the Negev and the whole region from the Valley of Jericho, the City of Palms, as far as Zoar. Then the Lord said to him, 'This is the land I promised on oath to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob when I said, "I will give it to your descendants." I have let you see it with your eyes, but you will not cross over into it.' And Moses the servant of the Lord died there in Moab, as the Lord had said. He buried him in Moab, in the valley opposite Beth Peor, but to this day no one knows where his grave is. Moses was a hundred and twenty years old when he died, yet his eyes were not nor his strength gone. The weak Israelites grieved for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days, until the time of weeping and mourning was over. Now Joshua son of Nun was filled with the spirit of wisdom because Moses had laid his hands on him. So the Israelites listened to him and did what the Lord had commanded Moses. Since then, no prophet has risen in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face, who did all those signs and wonders the Lord sent him to do in Egypt - to Pharaoh and to all his officials and to his whole land. For no one has ever shown the mighty power or performed the awesome deeds that Moses did in the sight of all Israel. This is the word of the Lord:

Second Reading:

1 Thessalonians 2:1-13

A reading from the first letter to the Thessalonians

You know, brothers and sisters, that our visit to you was not without results. We had previously suffered and been treated outrageously in Philippi, as you know, but with the help of our God we dared to tell you his gospel in the face of strong opposition. For the appeal we make does not spring from error or impure motives, nor are we trying to trick you. On the contrary, we speak as those approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel. We are not trying to please people but God, who tests our hearts. You know we never used flattery, nor did we put on a mask to cover up greed - God is our witness. We were not looking for praise from people, not from you or anyone else, even though as apostles of Christ we could have asserted our authority. Instead, like we were young children among you. Just as a nursing mother cares for her children, so cared for we you. Because we loved you so much, we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives well. Surely you remember, brothers and sisters, our toil and hardship; we worked night and day in order not to be a burden to anyone while we preached the gospel of God to you. You are witnesses, and so is God, of how holy, righteous and blameless we were among you who believed. For you know that we dealt with each of you as a father deals with his own children, encouraging, comforting and urging you to live lives worthy of God, who calls you into his kingdom and glory. And we also thank God continually because, when you received the word of God, which you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word, but as it actually is, the word of God, which is indeed at work in you who believe.



The Sustainable Development Goals are the blueprint to achieve a better and more sustainable future for all.

Goal 14: Life Below Water

For better or for worse, COVID has offered an opportunity to try new ways of engaging our community and our faith community – which we are still trying to work out. Our 'new normal' is a radical change to how we were – but I have a feeling it takes us back to the days when Jesus walked the roads and the byways of Galillee and Judea – meeting people, talking about the Scriptures, finding out what people are really thinking and what is really going on in their lives.

It is an opportunity to be a church that is RELEVANT and RESPONSIVE to our communities needs - before our own sometimes - in the manner of Jesus and the Gospel accounts. The building may indeed be closed, BUT THE CHURCH IS OPEN! Yes?

- 5. The church toilets are being cleaned on a regular basis for people's convenience. NO access to other parts of our church property are permitted.
- 6. The most important part for me is that parishioners may like to invite family or friends to join them at our Outdoor Services. This has always been a passion of mine! We have much to 'debrief' around our respective COVID experiences, and this is an opportunity to accompany each other with genuine engagement and grace. I won't always get it right, but I'm going to make the most of this opportunity to see where God's Spirit is leading us. I hope that you are willing to join me.
- 7. If you don't like any of the above talk to me! I want the best for ALL, but I won't be able to adapt or meet people's needs if I don't know whether there is discontent or dis-ease. I know that many are not used to 'challenging' the cleric, but I hope that you have gathered by now that I want to be <u>real</u>, and <u>honest</u>, and <u>genuine</u> and that we are building a life-giving community of resilience and flexibility.

I think that's all for the moment.

I've probably forgotten something important. The Bishop has also written in dNEws this week about current dialogue in media - regarding the opening of churches. I think his explanation is clear. Let's do what we can, and not what we can't - as we all negotiate this crazy time together.
