Hello Everyone! I hope your week has gone well for you.

As I write this, the rain has started to fall. Let's pray that it keeps falling for a good soaking. For all the expectation and hype, I trust that we won't be disappointed. Let's continue to pray for all our farmers in the region, and trust that as they finish seeding or rush to get everything else done - that they remain safe and grateful for God's bounty.

I've also had a RIPPER session at WSDS this morning doing DRUMBEAT with the younger co-hort. WOW! How much growth I have noticed over the last month. It is no fluke! 'We' (the school and I) started this connection 3-4 years ago, and have remained faithful to the weekly session – no matter who turned up or what the day held for us. There is a 'thing' called CPR's: Consistent, Predictable, Routines. When implemented – CPR's create safety and trust. CRP's develop opportunities for participants (this includes students but also the staff – who get just as much out of these sessions I reckon) to be involved through empowerment and encouragement because they know what is going to happen, and how the session is run, and can start to engage fully when they are ready and able.

The striking thing about today was the depth of calm in the group. When the environment is calm (which seems an oxymoron with 21 drums in the room) genuine learning and leadership start to emerge with a sense of joy (often measured in the lack of tears or screaming - true story), and I have a lovely sense in how the staff are connected to maintaining and enhancing this experience for all involved.

In our church's liturgical calendar, we enter a period of 'calm' - it used to be called 'Ordinary Time', but is now defined by the number of Sundays since Pentecost. 'Calm' is an oxymoron of course, because we continue to proclaim our Gospel message, and therefore we must embrace ourselves for Jesus' message to roll up our sleaves and get on with ministry and discipleship and governance etc Be bold. Be brave. Be beautiful - in all you do and say. Blessings, Rev James

TODAY'S READINGS SECOND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

First Reading:

1 Samuel 3:1-10

A reading from the first book of Samuel

The boy Samuel ministered before the Lord under Eli. In those days the word of the Lord was rare; there were not many visions. One night Eli, whose eyes were becoming so weak that he could barely see, was lying down in his usual place. The lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the house of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called Samuel. Samuel answered, 'Here I am.' And he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am; you called me.' But Eli said, 'I did not call; go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Again the Lord called, 'Samuel!' And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am; you called me.' 'My son,' Eli said, 'I did not call; go back and lie down.' Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord: the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. A third time the Lord called, 'Samuel!' And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am; you called me.' Then Eli realised that the Lord was calling the boy. So Eli told Samuel, 'Go and lie down, and if he calls you, say, "Speak, Lord , for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. The Lord came and stood there, calling as at the other times, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Then Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.'

Psalm:

139:1-6, 13-18

Response: I praise you O Lord for I am wonderfully made.

1. Lord, you have searched me out and known me: you know when I sit or when I stand, you comprehend my thoughts long before.

You discern my path and the places where I rest: you are acquainted with all my ways. (R)

- 2. For there is not a word on my tongue: but you, Lord, know it altogether. You have encompassed me behind and before: and have laid your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me: so high that I cannot endure it. **(R)**
- 3. Where shall I go from your spirit: or shall I flee from your where presence? I will praise you, for you are to be feared: fearful are your acts, and wonderful your works. (R)

Second Reading:

2 Corinthians 4:5-12

A reading from the second letter of Paul to the Corinthians

For what we preach is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. For God, who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' made his light shine in our

hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ. But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us. We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned: struck down. but not destroyed. We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body. For we who are alive are always being given over to death for Jesus' sake, so that his life may also be revealed in our mortal body. So then, death is at work in us, but life is at work in you.

Gospel:

Mark 2:23-3:6

A reading from the gospel according to Mark

One Sabbath Jesus was going through the cornfields, and as his disciples walked along, they began to pick some ears of corn. The Pharisees said to him, 'Look, why are they doing what is the Sabbath?' He unlawful on answered, 'Have you never read what David did when he and his companions were hungry and in need? In the days of Abiathar the high priest, he entered the house of God and ate the consecrated bread, which is lawful only for priests to eat. And he also gave some to his companions.' Then he said to them, 'The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. So the Son of Man is Lord even of the Sabbath.

Another time Jesus went into the synagogue, and a man with a shrivelled hand was there. Some of them were looking for a reason to accuse Jesus, so they watched him closely to see if he would heal him on the Sabbath. Jesus said to the man with the shrivelled hand. 'Stand up in front of everyone.' Then Jesus asked them, 'Which is lawful on the Sabbath: to do good or to do evil, to save life or to kill?' But they remained silent. He looked around at them in anger and, deeply distressed at their stubborn hearts, said to the man, 'Stretch out your hand.' He stretched it out, and his hand was completely restored. Then the Pharisees went out and began to plot with the Herodians how they might kill Jesus.
